From Fr. Joe

Just yesterday (Saturday, Dec 25th) we celebrated the Nativity of the Lord, and now on this Sunday after Christmas Jesus is already 12 years old! (*Wow, quite a jump in just one day – at least in Year C of the Lectionary.*) We hear of the account of his being lost — at least from his parents' perspective — for three days on the way home from when the Holy Family went up to Jerusalem to celebrate the feast of Passover. (*Most of us who are parents have experienced the terror of misplacing a child — even if just for a moment. Can you imagine not knowing where your child is for 3 days?!!!*) Besides being able to identify with the feelings that Mary and Joseph experienced in this incident, what does this Gospel account have to do with us and our families?

Well, does your family have any traditions? If so, is it important to keep those traditions alive? (*Maybe we need to make a distinction between good and not-so-good traditions. Those traditions that hold a family together are worth keeping, but those that bring division or harm would be better to let go.*) The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph were good Jews, and they faithfully kept the traditions that formed who they were, like traveling to Jerusalem to celebrate Passover. While the Holy Family held to those traditions, they were open to what God had in store for them, even if they didn't fully understand what or why. For example, Jesus, a mere youth astounding teachers in the temple, and then saying he must be in his Father's house. For Mary and Joseph, they may have wondered, 'What is going on here?' When we are unsure, confused, bewildered, it would be good to model Mary, who **kept all these things in her heart** (Luke 2:51), and who pondered.

"They [the Holy Family] teach us what it means to be 'in [our] Father's house,' where we learn our religious traditions and form the memories that make us who we are as members of the larger family of God. They teach us that we really belong to God, and everything about our living must reflect that we are most at home 'in [our] Father's house.' . . . Our families are schools of holiness, for there we learn the memories and traditions that make us who we are and who God wants us to be: holy, God's beloved children. Holiness is finding the way to be who we are in God's sight: people of a tradition and people open to God's new in-breaking." (2016 Living Liturgy, p.28)

Ok, but what does this have to do with us here at St. Mary of Hannah Parish? Well, we need to continue to bring ourselves and our families to church and to Mass, where we learn our religious traditions and form the

memories that make us who we are — Roman Catholics. And, we need to do this while being open to what God has in store for us as individuals, and as a parish, whether we fully understand or not. And when, like Mary, we are unsure, confused, or bewildered, let us keep things in our hearts and ponder for a while, before we open our mouths and cause more uncertainty, confusion, and bewilderment.

Here are a few things to ponder:

Joseph and Mary made sure they took Jesus to synagogue for Sabbath every week, and up to the temple in Jerusalem when it was prescribed for them to do so. When he left home and traveled with his disciples he continued to go to synagogue regularly (**"He came to Nazareth, where he had grown up, and went according to his custom into the synagogue on the Sabbath day."** Luke 4:1. *And the custom of a good Jew was to go to the synagogue every Sabbath.*) If anyone — any family — should get a break on the obligation to go to the temple or synagogue regularly (*or Mass on Sunday*), it would be Jesus, the Son of God, and his parents. Yet they faithfully went every week. When someone you know — or maybe even yourself — wonders if we have to go to Mass every Sunday, the answer is **"YES!"** Let the Holy Family be your guide to show your family how to be "holy". Be parents (*like Mary and Joseph*) who fulfill all the prescriptions of the law of the Lord, and create a home where your child(ren) can grow and become strong, and filled with wisdom. Be parents who care enough for their children to want them to get to heaven, *and who want their spouse to get to heaven.*


Did you know that when fathers take their Catholic faith seriously and live it faithfully, their children are more likely to be — and remain — faithful? (*This is not just a nice thing to say, it is statistically true.*)

Mothers who give thanks to God for their child(ren), who speak words of hope to those who have lost hope, and who speak the truth, give them a mother's perspective of Jesus.

With the New Year soon upon us, a wonderful New Year's resolution — and one that will help you and your family get to heaven — is to be a holy family. If yours isn't yet, there's no better time to start than now. And if yours already is, continue to be faithful, continue to be holy. We need more holy families. Look to the Holy Family as a guide; pray to the Holy Family for their help.

As we celebrate the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, let us strive to be the holy family God has called us to be.

LOOP HEARING SYSTEM

Do you have difficulty hearing when you are in church? Are you frustrated that you can't hear very well even though you use a hearing aid? For those who have hearing aids, soon you will be able to hear better if your hearing aid has "t-coil" or "telecoil" technology and if you actually use your hearing aid.

How do you know if your hearing aid has a "t-coil"? Most hearing aids now already have the t-coil technology built into them, it just needs to be turned on. Check with your hearing aid provider if yours has a t-coil (*it probably does*) and if so, how to activate it. We are having a LOOP system installed at St. Mary of Hannah Church – the installers are scheduled to be here this week, so the system should be up and going next weekend.

What makes a LOOP system so different? Hearing aids pick up (or try to) the sounds that come to the ear. Someone wearing a hearing aid in church picks up the sounds coming from the speakers of our sound system, as well as other background noises. Those who don't have difficulty hearing don't usually notice all the noise interference, but for those with hearing aids it is often a big problem being able to hear clearly. What a LOOP system does for those who have a t-coil in their hearing aid is send the sound directly to their hearing aid – they are not picking it up second-hand from the regular sound speakers. The sound is transmitted directly to their ear, and so is much clearer.

So, if you or someone you know has a hearing aid, check to see if it has a t-coil and if it is turned on, and enjoy being able to hear better at Mass. And if you know someone who doesn't come to Mass because they haven't been able to hear what going on, tell them about the LOOP system, and encourage them to come to Mass again.

NEW CANDLE RACK

There is another devotional candle rack now available, and located in the back of church near the statue of Mary cradling the dead body of Jesus. All of these candles are the larger 7-day candles, with the suggested offering of \$3.00. At this time, until we get a secure offering box on that rack, if you light one of those candles, please put your candle offering in the box on the candle rack in the front of the church (near the statue of Mary). 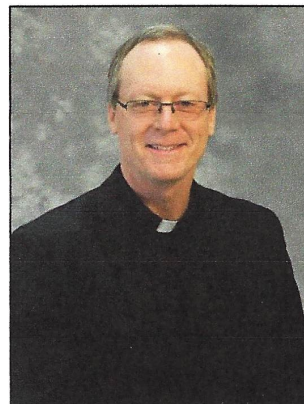

Pope Francis Names Reverend Jeffrey J. Walsh as Sixth Bishop of the Diocese of Gaylord

For Immediate Release | December 21, 2021

GAYLORD, MICHIGAN — His Holiness Pope Francis has named the Reverend Jeffrey J. Walsh, priest of the Diocese of Scranton, Pennsylvania, as the sixth bishop of the Diocese of Gaylord. The announcement was made today by Archbishop Christophe Pierre, Apostolic Nuncio to the United States, in Washington, D.C.

Bishop-elect Walsh, 56, is a priest of the Diocese of Scranton and currently serves as pastor of Saint Rose of Lima Parish, Carbondale, and Our Lady of Mount Carmel Parish, Carbondale. Bishop-elect Walsh's episcopal ordination and installation as sixth bishop of the Diocese of Gaylord has been set for March 4, 2022, at 2 p.m. in St. Mary Cathedral, Gaylord.



As sixth bishop of the Diocese of Gaylord, Bishop-elect Walsh succeeds the Most Reverend Steven J. Raica, J.C.D., D.D. Bishop Raica served as shepherd of the diocese from August 28, 2014 until June 23, 2020, at which time he was installed as bishop of the Diocese of Birmingham in Alabama. Since June 2020, while the diocese was a vacant see, Bishop Walter A. Hurley has served as Apostolic Administrator of the Diocese of Gaylord.

"With gratitude to our Holy Father Pope Francis, and joy in the Lord, I am eager to begin a new chapter in my life of discipleship among the good people of the Diocese of Gaylord!" said Bishop-elect Walsh. "I am also most grateful to God for 27 years of priestly ministry in the Diocese of Scranton. I have been inspired and challenged to grow in faith through various diocesan assignments and will forever prayerfully remember all the lay faithful, religious, deacons, priests and bishops with whom and for whom I have served.

"In particular, I would like to acknowledge the kind support of Bishop Joseph C. Bambera. The most important act of gratitude I can offer is for my parents, Jerome and Nancy (Doud) Walsh. They, as well as my deceased grandparents, have been the most significant formators of my life. I have been blessed with a solid, but by no means 'perfect,' family that also includes my two brothers, two nieces, one nephew, aunts and uncles and many close first cousins. Looking forward, I hope to bring a missionary spirit to my episcopal ministry under the mantle of Divine Providence. From 'Penn's Woods' to the land of 'Great Lakes,' I trust God's loving plan."

Bishop-elect Walsh was born on November 29, 1965. The son of Jerome and Nancy Walsh, he is a native of Scranton, Pa., and is a graduate of Scranton Central High School. He is one of three children, with brothers James and Joseph Walsh. He graduated from the University of Scranton in 1987 with a bachelor's degree in Health and Human Resources. He went on to complete his priestly studies at Mount St. Mary's

Seminary, Emmitsburg, Md., earning a Master of Divinity Degree. Bishop-elect Walsh received a Master of Arts in Christian Spirituality from Creighton University in 1999 and a Master of Social Work Degree from Marywood University in 2010.

Bishop-elect Walsh was ordained a priest of the Diocese of Scranton by Bishop James C. Timlin at the Cathedral of Saint Peter, Scranton, Pa., on June 25, 1994. After ordination, Bishop-elect Walsh served as assistant pastor at Saint Rose of Lima Church, Carbondale, and the Cathedral of Saint Peter, Scranton. In July 1999, he was appointed to his first pastorate at Saint Mary of the Lake Church, Lake Winola, as well as Director of Spiritual & Liturgical Formation at Saint Pius X Seminary in Dalton, Pa.. From July 2004-July 2006, he served as pastor at Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary Church, Tunkhannock, until being appointed to serve as Episcopal Vicar for the Eastern Pastoral Region of the Diocese of Scranton.

In 2008, Bishop-elect Walsh became administrator of Saint Rita Church, Gouldsboro, and in 2009 was appointed administrator of Saint Anthony, Saint Bridget and Saint John the Baptist parishes in Throop. In July 2010, Bishop-elect Walsh was appointed to serve as pastor at the Church of Saint John, East Stroudsburg.

In January 2015, he was appointed Episcopal Vicar for Clergy by Bishop Joseph C. Bambera. While serving in that role, Bishop-elect Walsh also served as Sacramental Minister for Our Lady of the Eucharist Parish, Pittston. In July 2020, he was appointed pastor at Saint Rose of Lima Parish, Carbondale, and Our Lady of Mount Carmel Parish, Carbondale. As Bishop-elect Walsh prepares to depart for Gaylord, Saint Rose of Lima Parish just completed a large-scale renovation project on its nearly 150-year-old building.

During his years of pastoral ministry, Bishop-elect Walsh also served in a variety of diocesan positions, including Director of Religious Formation at the former Sacred Heart High School in Carbondale and the former Bishop Hannan High School in Scranton. For five years he was chaplain at Saint Michael's School and for 12 years (1995-2007) he served as chaplain to the Deaf Community. Bishop-elect Walsh has also served as diocesan vocations director, was director of youth and young adult retreats at Fatima Center, and served for one year as the Diocesan Deputy Secretary for Catholic Human Services. In 2007, he was also appointed to the Board of Directors of the Notre Dame Regional School System.

Upon hearing the news of Bishop-elect Walsh's appointment, the current Apostolic Administrator of the Diocese of Gaylord, Bishop Walter A. Hurley, stated, "I am grateful to our Holy Father for appointing Bishop-elect Walsh to serve as the sixth bishop of the Diocese of Gaylord. I warmly welcome him to this diocese, a unique and special region of Michigan, and assure him of our prayers and support as he looks forward to taking on this responsibility and his upcoming ordination and installation in March."
