From Fr. Joe

In last Sunday's Gospel (John 1:35-42) John the Baptist pointed Jesus out as he walked by, saying, "Behold, the Lamb of God." Andrew, a disciple of John the Baptist, was one of those who heard John and followed Jesus and asked him, "Rabbi, where are you staying?" And after Jesus answered, "Come, and you will see", "they went and saw where Jesus was staying, and they stayed with him that day." After that encounter with Jesus, Andrew told his brother, Simon Peter, that "We have found the Messiah", and brought him to meet Jesus.

Now, in the Gospel on this 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time (Mark 1:14-20) we hear one more account of the call of Jesus' first apostles – the brothers Simon (Peter) and Andrew – along with another set of brothers – the sons of Zebedee: James and John. This time it is Jesus who comes across them, initiates the encounter, and says, "Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men." And both sets of brothers left everything and followed him.

With these two Gospels occurring on successive Sundays you might wonder (as I did), "Well, then which way did it happen?" Admittedly, these are two different Gospels – one according to Mark, the other to John – and while there is no corroborating evidence within these two Gospels to suggest it could be a situation of both/and, there is also no apparent evidence (at least as far as I know) to suggest that it has to be either/or. John's account could be how those first apostles met Jesus, and Mark's account could be how they were invited by and responded to Jesus to follow him.

Okayyy ... so what are you getting at Fr. Joe? What's the big deal with the distinction? It is simply this: it's one thing to know about someone (to meet, be introduced to, obtain a little knowledge of them); it's another thing to choose to leave everything else behind and wholeheartedly follow someone. It's fine — and good — to know about Jesus. But Jesus calls us to so much more - to follow him. (Don't worry — Jesus doesn't ask all of us to leave 'everything' else behind, but he also doesn't want the 'everything' to keep us from following him.)

This calling of the two sets of brothers, Peter and Andrew, and James and John in Mark's Gospel (Mark 1:14-20), is often used – and rightfully so – in reference to vocations, in particular to ordained ministry (priests and deacons) and religious life. However, as special, as

important, and as needed as those vocations are, they are not the ones that the majority of people will be called to. Also, some people will have more than one vocation, and one of those might be their livelihood aka, their job, how they make a living. And for the majority who are not called to ordained ministry or religious life there are two vocation options they typically have open to them. One of them is the vocation to the single life. The other is the vocation of marriage. Someone called to the true vocation of the single life is not a person who is afraid or unwilling to make a permanent commitment (particularly in regard to a person of the opposite sex), but someone who is committed to a chaste single life. And those who are called to the vocation of marriage, are committed to the chastity appropriate for married life (i.e. faithful lifelong commitment to one's spouse).

So, what is all of this leading to? At some point we (individually and communally) need to affirm what we believe by doing or witnessing to what we believe, in whatever vocation we are called to, by how we live our lives — each and every day. And when we fall short of, and maybe actually do things against our vocation, we need to own up to that, to turn away from and repent of that (and here is where the Sacrament of Reconciliation—aka Confession—is a tremendous help), and to make reparation when we can.

In the wake of the January 8th release of the Michigan Attorney General's report regarding clergy sexual abuse in the Diocese, Bishop Walsh has asked that Masses of Reparation be prayed in the parishes of our diocese on Wednesday, January 24th. So, this Wednesday there will be Masses of Reparation at 12 noon at St. Patrick and 6pm at St. Mary of Hannah. (Since there is usually Adoration with Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament from 6-8pm on Wednesdays at St. Mary of Hannah, Adoration will begin after that 6pm Mass and continue to 8pm.) Everything won't be suddenly "okay" following these Masses of Reparation, but they are an appropriate and necessary start in the right direction. These Masses of Reparation are not Masses we are obligated to attend, but if you are able to, please help our diocese begin to heal from this scandal.

Have another blessed week in Ordinary Time, and of being faithful to the vocation you have been called to.

A Journey through the Mass - continued

(We had left off with the Sign of Peace)

After the <u>sign of peace</u>, comes the <u>Fraction Rite</u> (the breaking of the larger host). In Luke's Gospel there is the post-resurrection account of Jesus walking along the road to Emmaus with two dejected disciples who didn't recognize who Jesus was (*see Luke 24:13-35*). While journeying with them he enlightened them regarding what referred to him in the scriptures. When Jesus shared a meal with them, they finally recognized Jesus and he vanished from their sight. The two disciples returning from Emmaus recounted "how Jesus was made known to them in the breaking of bread." (Luke 24:35) In fact, the Eucharist itself was once called "the breaking of the bread" (see Acts 2:42). Actually, a few things happen simultaneously or in very close succession, that it is almost one action. As the *Agnus Dei* (Lamb of God), is begun, the Priest alone, or with the assistance of a deacon, breaks the Eucharistic bread (or at least the larger host).

The gesture of breaking bread done by Christ at the Last Supper signifies that the many faithful are made one body (1 Cor 10:17) by receiving Communion from the one Bread of Life, which is Christ, who for the salvation of the world died and rose again. . . . The Priest breaks the Bread and puts a piece of the host into the chalice [aka: the "commingling"] to signify the unity of the Body and Blood of the Lord in the work of salvation, namely, the Body of Jesus Christ, living and glorious. The supplication Agnus Dei (Lamb of God) is usually sung, or at least recited aloud. This invocation accompanies the fraction of the bread and, for this reason, may be repeated as many times as necessary until the rite has been completed. The final time it concludes with the words grant us peace. (GIRM 83)

There is a beautiful prayer that the priest prays quietly as he puts the piece of the host into the chalice: May this mingling of the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ bring eternal life to us who receive it. (So, when allowed again, if you happen to receive the Precious Blood from the priest's chalice during Communion, and see a little piece of a host, it's okay, it's not backwash — the priest put it there.)

It is ironic that the "breaking of the bread" — the tearing apart of the host — is actually a sign of unity. It brings out "more clearly the force and importance of the sign of unity of all in the one bread, and of the sign of charity by the fact that the one bread is distributed among the brothers and sisters" (GIRM 321). Though there are many of us, we become what we eat — the one Body of Christ.

After the Fraction Rite (breaking of bread), which is accompanied by the Agnus Dei (Lamb of God), and the Commingling (placing part of the consecrated host into the chalice with the Precious Blood), the "Priest prepares himself by a prayer, said quietly, so that he may fruitfully receive the Body and Blood of Christ. The faithful do the same, praying silently." (GIRM 84) As the priest is praying this prayer, the faithful — at least in parishes that have kneelers — kneel after the Agnus Dei. So, even if there is no conscious prayer of preparation on the part of the people, the kneeling itself is preparation to receive Christ's Body and Blood. (Catholics pray not just with words, but with actions as well, and using all the senses. That's one of the wonderful things about being Catholic!)

Then what follows is the <u>Invitation to Communion</u>, the words of which are taken from Scripture. After the priest prays his preparation prayer, he genuflects, and then shows the Eucharistic bread to the people, holding it slightly raised above the paten or above the chalice, as he says aloud: "Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world." (The words John the Baptist said as Jesus approached him. See John 1:29). Then the priest immediately adds: "Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb." (Words drawn from those of an angel in Revelation 19:9, referring to the Mass — the Eucharist — as the wedding feast of the Lamb.) Then the people, along with the priest, respond: "Lord, I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof, but only say the word and my soul shall be healed." (Derived from the words spoken with humility by the centurion to Jesus in Matt 8:8) While these words of invitation and response are prayed, the people are invited to look at the Eucharistic Bread and to express reverence, confidence, and faith.
